1 - THE REGIONAL ORGANIZERS

2 - WELCOME TO AUVERGNE-RHÔNE-ALPES!







Auvergne-Rhône-Alpes is a region in southeast-central France resulting from the merger of Auvergne and Rhône-Alpes which came into effect on 1 January 2016. It is the third largest in metropolitan France; it had a population of 7,994,459 in 2018, second to Île-de-France (Paris). The name of the region refers directly to the three major geographical components: Auvergne (Massif Central), Vallée du Rhône, the Alps.

- The Massif Central consists of mountains and plateaus covering about 15% of mainland France. This area was subject to volcanism that has subsided in the last 10,000 years.
- The Vallée du Rhône is located on either side of the Rhône, downstream from Lyon. It is a territory with a dynamic agricultural industry.
- The Alps are the highest and most extensive mountain range system that lies entirely in Europe. Mont Blanc spans the French-Italian border, and at 4,809 m.

Auvergne-Rhône-Alpes is the leading industrial region in France, with more than 22,000 companies and nearly 20% of national industrial employment, representing 500,000 employees. The most important sectors are: the metallurgical industry, the food industry, the production of manufacturing machinery and polymer manufacturing (plastics and textile).

..... and to LYON







Lyon is the third-largest city and second-largest metropolitan area of France with a population of 522,228 in 2020 within its small municipal territory of 48 km2 but together with its suburbs and exurbs the Lyon metropolitan area had a population of 2,293,180. Lyon is the prefecture of the Auvergne-Rhône-Alpes region.

The capital of the Gauls during the Roman Empire, Lyon became a major economic hub during the Renaissance. Lyon was historically an important area for the production and weaving of silk. The city became an important industrial town in the 19th century. The GDP of Lyon was 124 billion US dollars in 2019, making it the second richest city in France after Paris. Lyon and its region Rhône-Alpes represent one of the most important economies in Europe.

Lyon played a significant role in the history of cinema since Auguste and Louis Lumière invented the cinematograph there. The city is known for its light festival, the Fête des Lumières, which begins every 8 December and lasts for four days, earning Lyon the title of "Capital of Lights". Lyon is also a city of sport, home to the football club Olympique Lyonnais. OL operates a women's team, Olympique Lyonnais Féminin, which won 14 consecutive top-flight championships and the UEFA Women's Champions League 8 times.

3 - WHAT AND WHERE TO EAT

The city of Lyon is recognised for its cuisine and gastronomy. The "cuisine lyonnaise" occupies a special place in French gastronomy. The fame of this cuisine owes a lot to the "mothers of Lyon" who were, in the 19th century, middle-class women who left their homes to work as cooks and created brand new culinary traditions incorporating their regional roots. As a result of Lyon's geographical location, many different culinary influences have converged in the city's cuisine, particularly those of the South (Provence and the Mediterranean) and of the North (Alsace and Lorraine). Each cuisine imparts its own characteristics.

Some specialities to discover the "cuisine lyonnaise"



Salade Lyonnaise

Green salad leaves, fried smoked bacon, dry bread croutons browned in butter, a poached egg



Hot sausage steamed in the oven in a soft brioche dough





Cervelle de canut

Cottage cheese or fresh goat cheese, seasoned with chopped fresh herbs, shallot, salt, pepper, olive oil and vinegar




Small cheese made from cow's milk, soft with a bloomy rind





Quenelles

Soft cylindrical paste poached in boiling water. Can be meat, fish, vegetable. To be asked with "Sauce Nantua".



The praline is a candy consisting of an almond or a peanut browned in cooked sugar tinted pink.



Paul Bocuse

Paul Bocuse was a French chef based in Lyon who was known for having Three Stars in the Michelin Guide for 53 years, from 1965 until his death in 2018. Bocuse made many innovative contributions to French gastronomy. Since 1987, the Bocuse d'Or has been regarded as the most prestigious award for chefs in the world. One of his most famous creation is *soupe aux truffes* (truffle soup) for a presidential dinner at the Élysée Palace. Since then, the soup has been served in Bocuse's restaurant as Soupe V.G.E., VGE being the initials of former president of France Valéry Giscard d'Estaing.



Coming to Lyon requires eating in a "Bouchon". The "Bouchon" is a typical restaurant where you can eat specialties, including tablier de sapeur, quenelles, Lyonnaise salad and cervelles de canut. Everything is usually served very copiously and washed down with a glass of wine. This traditional place must be simple and friendly. There is a label to identify authentic "Bouchons".

TO STAY IN SAINT-ETIENNE

Saint-Etienne is 1-hour far from Lyon by car and 45-min by train. Finding a hotel in Saint-Etienne is a longer solution in terms of transport but less expensive.

Trains from Saint-Etienne to Lyon are very regular and numerous from very early in the morning to very late in the evening. The round trip costs 26€ per day.

Energy



- 1. Register on https://ec.europa.eu/eusurvey/runner/eccpclustersmeetregions by end of September if possibly
- 2. Verify your mailbox (and spams) from the beginning of October, you will receive an email from Pollutec asking you to register in the platform of the industrial fair.
 - 3. Complete the registration form and accept the free invitation
- 4. You will receive your badge some days before the beginning of the fair
- 5. Print your badge and do not forget it to access Clusters Meet Regions
